

Madisonville Community College Physical Therapist Assistant Program Program Guide

This program prepares the individual to become a physical therapist assistant (PTA) who is able to perform selected components of interventions and data collection under the direction and supervision of a physical therapist. The program is accredited by the Commission on Accreditation in Physical Therapy Education (CAPTE*). The curriculum combines general education and physical therapy courses. Various facilities are utilized for clinical experiences. The graduate is eligible to sit for the national licensing examination for the physical therapist assistant. Enrollment in this program is limited; therefore, a selective admissions process is followed. Students enrolled in the Physical Therapist Assistant program must achieve a minimum grade of "C" in each required general education course; a minimum grade of "C" in each required PTA didactic course; and a grade of pass in each clinical practicum course to complete the program.

TECHNICAL STANDARDS

The physical therapist assistant works in a hands-on situation under the supervision of a licensed physical therapist by providing patient services for the prevention and alleviation of physical impairment and the restoration of function. *Therefore, in order to work successfully with patients, all applicants should possess:*

1. Sufficient visual acuity, such as observation, necessary for administering patient care and reading equipment gauges and settings used in treatments.
2. Sufficient auditory perception to receive verbal communication and to execute patient care through the use of monitoring devices.
3. Sufficient strength and gross and fine motor coordination to respond promptly and to implement patient care skills, such as the manipulation of equipment, and positioning and lifting patients.
4. Sufficient communication skills (speech, reading, writing) to interact with individuals and to communicate their needs promptly and effectively, as may be necessary in the patient's interest.
5. Sufficient intellectual and emotional functions to implement the plan of care.

APPLICATION FOR ADMISSION TO THE PROGRAM

Sixteen students are admitted to the Physical Therapist Assistant Program once a year in the Spring Semester. Interested applicants must complete and submit a PTA Program Application Packet in order to be considered for admission. It is the responsibility of the applicant to ensure that the items listed below are included in the Application Packet and are on file in the PTA office no later than the deadline of October 1st.

EQUAL OPPORTUNITY

All applicants meeting the appropriate academic requirements and technical standards shall be considered equally for admission to a community college or to any academic program thereof regardless of race, color, religion, sex, marital status, national origin, sexual orientation, age, beliefs, mental or physical disability.

ADMISSION TO THE PROGRAM

The Physical Therapist Assistant Program is a selective admissions program. Admission to Madisonville Community College does **NOT** imply admission to the PTA Program. Meeting the minimum academic and other prerequisites does **NOT** imply admission to the PTA Program. Selection of students for the Physical Therapist Assistant Program will be made by the President of the College or designee after considering the recommendations of the PTA Admissions Committee.*

**Enrollment in the PTA program may be limited because of insufficient faculty and financial resources at the college and/or the availability of campus or clinical facilities.*

The PTA Admissions Committee will make recommendations for admission based upon the following:

1. Successful completion of all prerequisite coursework with a grade of a “C” or higher in each course.
2. Preference will be given to applicants with:
 - a) cumulative (overall) Grade Point Average (GPA) of 3.0 or higher. Overall GPA is calculated based on **all** previous college coursework completed through the summer semester preceding the date of application. Mid-term grades for classes in which the

applicant is enrolled during the semester of application will **NOT** be used in the calculation of an applicant's overall GPA.

- b) A KEY GPA of 3.0 or higher in BIO 137 (Human Anatomy & Physiology I) and BIO 139 (Human Anatomy and Physiology II); a mid-term grade will be used for KEY GPA calculation for applicants enrolled in BIO 139 at the time of application.
- c) An ACT/SAT equivalent composite score of 19 or higher;
- d) Kentucky residents;
- e) Applicants who present documentation of a minimum of 16 clock hours of observation, volunteer or work experience in a physical therapy setting;
- f) Applicants who have taken a physics course and/or medical terminology course and received a grade of "C" or higher; and,
- g) Any other considerations brought before the committee, such as:
 - Information regarding an applicant's likelihood of success in the Program, and/or
 - Information regarding an applicant's ability to make a positive contribution to the profession and/or abide by the legal and ethical guidelines of physical therapy practice.

POINT SYSTEM FOR ADMISSION

Students who are interested in applying for admission to the Madisonville Community College Physical Therapist Assistant Program must meet the minimum standards set by (1) The Community College System Senate, and (2) Madisonville Community College. Meeting the minimum standards permits a student to be included in the qualified applicant pool, but does **not** guarantee admission to the PTA Program. Students who do not meet the minimum standards and who are not in the qualified applicant pool cannot be admitted to the PTA Program. The minimum standards to be admitted to the MCC PTA Program are:

1. Completion of ENG 101, MT 110, or MT 150, BIO 137, BIO 139, and PSY 100 or PY 110 with a grade of "C" or higher by the end of the Fall semester;
2. Minimum of 8 hours of observation, volunteer or work experience in a physical therapy setting (4 hours must be in a hospital physical therapy department);
3. Submissions of valid ACT/SAT score.

After the qualified applicant pool has been established, students will earn points based on certain levels of performance. Students with the highest total points on the Point System for Admission will be preferred for admission to the program (limit 16 students). The maximum number of earned points is 100. Please see Table 1 for more details regarding the Point System for Admission.

NOTIFICATION OF ADMISSION STATUS

ALL applicants will be notified by MAIL regarding selection status (i.e. each application will receive an "acceptance" or "rejection" letter). Telephone calls or personal requests regarding an applicant's selection status will **NOT** be acknowledged.

POST-ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

If admitted to the PTA program, students must:

1. Complete a Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation Certification Course (1 and 2 person adult, child, and infant). Training is usually offered during a PTA Student Orientation period before PTA classes begin. The fee for CPR training is approximately \$35.
2. Submit results of a current TB Skin Test (often offered free to health care employees)
3. Provide documented proof of immunity to measles, mumps and rubella or vaccination against (MMR)
4. Purchase liability insurance coverage via the Kentucky Community & Technical College System (approximately \$20.00 per year). This is provided during PTA Student Orientation.
5. Purchase appropriate uniform attire to be worn during Clinical Practicums.
6. Purchase books and supplies for the academic year. Excluding Clinical Practicum expenses, anticipated cost is ~\$850.00.
7. Complete a HIV/AIDS Home Study Course, before PTA classes begin. This course must be approved by the Kentucky State Board of Physical Therapy. Materials and information for the approved course will be distributed during PTA Orientation. Cost is approximately \$25.00.
8. Provide documentation of Hepatitis B immunization or signed declination form.
9. Purchase an identification badge. Cost is approximately \$5.00.
10. Provide documented proof of medical insurance or signed waiver form.
11. Maintain active membership in the Madisonville Community College Physical Therapist Assistant Club (PTAC). Dues are approximately \$5.00 per year.
12. Maintain current membership in the American Physical Therapy Association.
13. Dues are approximately \$80.00 per year.
14. Pay Tuition: See the current MCC Schedule of Classes for current tuition rates.

Students will be given more specific details regarding cardiopulmonary resuscitation certification training and HIV/AIDS schedules, liability insurance, immunizations, and program specific requirements and expenses upon admission to the PTA Program.

CLINICAL INTERNSHIP EXPERIENCES

Clinical education is a critical component of the PTA Curriculum. The PTA Program is committed to ensuring that each student receives a variety of the highest quality clinical experiences possible by carefully considering a variety of factors in determining individual student clinical placements. These factors include, but are not limited to, the following:

- 1) The overall number and variety of clinical sites available for student placement,
- 2) The number and type of clientele served at individual clinical sites,
- 3) The geographical location of various clinical sites and the secondary costs of travel and/or housing associated with its location,
- 4) Student interest in a given physical therapy setting,
- 5) Student concerns regarding travel or other personal issues which may be associated with placement at given clinical sites, and
- 6) The compatibility of individual clinical instructors and students which may affect optimal learning.

No student will be placed at a clinical site without prior didactic training in the clinical skills required. Therefore, student clinical experiences will be scheduled as follows:

Clinical Practicum I. Semester 1- Integrated clinical experience.

½ day clinical (4 hrs. per week) for 15 weeks (Total, 60 contact hours)

Students will be placed at one of the following Trover Health Systems, Sports Medicine and Rehabilitation clinical sites:

- a) Madisonville Office
- b) Hopkinsville Office
- c) Princeton Office
- d) Dawson Springs Office

This experience is primarily for observation, skill monitoring, and the application and integration of theoretic concepts to clinical situations.

Clinical Practicum II. Semester 2 – Terminal clinical experience.

Full-time clinical (40 hrs. per week) for 4 weeks (Total, 160 contact hours)

Students will be placed in an outpatient setting with which the program has a current contract.

Clinical Practicum III. Semester 3 – Terminal clinical experience

2, full-time (40 hrs. per week) for 5 weeks each (Total, 400 contact hours)

All efforts will be made to place students in an acute care and rehabilitation setting with which the program has a current contract.

Students are encouraged to review information provided by the program regarding each clinical facility. After reviewing this information, students are encouraged to make recommendations to the ACCE for individual clinical placements based upon their individual goals and needs. The final decision regarding clinical placements for each student will be made by the ACCE/Program Coordinator.

To prevent a potential conflict of interest, students may not request a clinical affiliation in which 1) they have been employed in the PT department; 2) they have accepted employment after graduation; or 3) they have accepted scholarship money in return for employment after graduation, unless approved by the ACCE or Program Coordinator.

All costs for clinical education are the student's responsibility. This includes, but is not limited to: transportation, housing, meals, liability insurance, drug screenings, background checks, and immunizations or physicals. Students are expected to have reliable transportation to and from all clinical affiliations. Students must assume responsibility for securing housing, if needed, for their selected affiliation. The student should be prepared to travel to clinical sites.

PHYSICAL THERAPIST ASSISTANT CURRICULUM
